HERALDRY OF THE COLLEGE

The upper portion of the badge of the College consists of a golden lion in a passant stance superimposed on the chief which is red in colour.

The lower portion of the badge consists of a green cross superimposed on a white shield. The green cross symbolizes the humanitarian mission of our College. White is the colour of purity which is our aim.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE 2017



The year ending 31 March 2017 was eventful and saw many positive developments. The promise of a better future for family medicine continues to shine brightly. I am pleased to report that the 25th Council will complete its term with the successful completion of some key initiatives.

Membership and Community Engagement

The membership of the College as of 31 March 2017 increased from 1892 to 1998. Although we have been seeing year on year increases in membership, the rate of increase still falls below the number of new medical practitioners who qualify for membership. Our Council continues to invest effort and resources to engage medical students and increase the visibility of the good work that our College is doing. Our collaboration with the Joint Committee on Family Medicine Singapore (JCFMS) to co-organize career seminars has now become an annual affair and the highlight of the activities of student Special Interest Group. We believe our on-going effort to engage medical students will bear fruit in the next few years. As it is, family medicine residency programs are experiencing unprecedented increases in the number of applicants compared to the earlier years. Our GDFM course has also seen unprecedented increase in numbers of applicants. Our effort to engage the media in promoting a positive image of family medicine is making good headway. We worked with our consultants at Weber Shandwick to highlight the important role played by our College as a national body representing family doctors and advocating high standards of patient care. As a result, our College was featured positively in many newspaper articles, radio and television broadcasts. These were all very well received.

Assets

I am reassured to see that our College's financial situation remains robust. This is testament to the good stewardship of our Council. Our financial reserves provide stability and security for the operations of our College. We do not receive direct funding from the government. Although we are a charity, the funding we receive from donations is negligible. We must remember lessons from the past when we saw the College's reserves dwindled in a downward spiral which could have ended in insolvency. I hope the future Councils and our membership will continue to build and safeguard our reserves. This will ensure that our College will always be a viable champion of family medicine, way into the future.

Courses conducted

The Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine, the Master of Medicine Family Medicine (College Program) and the Fellowship of the College of Family Physicians Singapore (By Assessment) are the signature programs run by our College and they continue to do well. The curriculum and delivery of these programs are constantly reviewed and improved over the years. We need to keep these programs relevant by adapting to the new education environment. More importantly, we need to ensure that our training programs continue to improve patient care by being responsive to the changing needs of our patients and our community. We need to be aligned with national healthcare priorities. From time to time, we will need to deliver a concentrated upgrade to our programs beyond the constant cycles of improvements. This will ensure that our programs will always be relevant and beneficial towards improving patient care.

Partnerships

Our College have helped to foster excellent relationship with the Singapore Medical Association and the Academy of Medicine Singapore. The three professional bodies hold regular dialogues to keep each other updated of one another's activities. On matters that require a whole of medical profession approach, we had taken joint action. This had resulted in positive developments in improving the newly developed ethical code and the on-going engagement to reverse negative trends in the relationship between Third Party Administrators and medical practitioners. The College continues to have a good working relationship with the Ministry of Health and the Singapore Medical Council. We are consulted regularly on policy matters. We had made many suggestions which were well appreciated and had resulted in improvements to proposed regulations.

Major Developments

The 25th Council had initiated some key developments that will have a major impact on the future development of family medicine in Singapore.

The Family Medicine for OUR Singapore (FAMOUS) Project was instituted as a concerted effort to understand present trends and the likely future landscape of family medicine. The interim findings were reported at the World Family Doctor Day 2017 dinner and the June 2017 issue of our College Mirror. The findings and recommendations will have a major impact on family medicine development and provide guidance for our efforts to improve the state of family medicine in Singapore.

Enhancement of the GDFM was another landmark development that was initiated in close collaboration with the Primary and Community Care Division of the Ministry of Health. The revamp and review of the GDFM curriculum is timely in view of the changing healthcare needs of our population and the increased intake in recent years (from 114 in 2014 to 235 applicants in 2017). The review of the curriculum by the College appointed Committee had been completed and presented to the Joint Committee on Family Medicine Singapore. The revamp will see enhancements in areas of need such as chronic disease management, geriatrics and mental health. Applicants who wish to acquire competency in community hospital practice can choose to take additional modules and be credited with a Certificate of Competency. This additional certificate will be issued by the College and recognized by the community hospitals. An implementation taskforce will be set up to operationalize the new program in academic year of 2018.

The term of the 25th Council comes to an end with great promise and expectations of the future. I would like to thank my fellow Council Members for their dedication and the personal sacrifices that they had made to ensure the wellbeing of our organization. We also have a dedicated army of volunteer faculty in all the College training programs. They work selflessly and tirelessly to pass on their skills and knowledge to the next generation of family physicians. They epitomize the true meaning of professionalism. Such commitment from altruistic and like-minded members is the lifeblood of our organization.

Last but not least, special thanks is accorded to our long suffering Secretariat staff, who labour quietly and efficiently in the background to ensure that all goes well for our College.

It is an unreserved honour and privilege to be part of this movement for the good of our fraternity and our patients. On behalf of the Council, I would like to thank everyone who had helped our common cause in one way or another.

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT/ MEDICAL EDUCATION PROGRAMMES AND COURSES

The College promotes Continuing Professional Development (CPD) and Continuing Medical Education (CME) through the Family Medicine Modular Course, Family Practice Skills Course, MMed (Family Medicine) Programme B, Family Medicine Membership and Fellowship Programme.

The Institute of Family Medicine (IFM), an organ within the College, plays a significant role in developing the contents and syllabi of these programmes and courses.

During the year the IFM reviewed, updated and edited the notes as well as their e-learning components for Modules 1, 2, 3 and 8 of the Family Medicine Modular Course to make them more relevant and user-friendly to the course participants.

The Family Medicine Modular Course consists of 8 modules of knowledge acquisition and is a requirement for doctors who are preparing for the Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) Programme and the Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) College Programme. Each year, four modules are covered.

For the year April 2016 - March 2017, there were 169 trainees registered in the GDFM course, 35 trainees in the MMed(FM) College Route and 19 trainees in the Fellowship [FCFP(S)] programme.

Family Practice Skills Course (FPSC)

During this financial year, the College conducted four Family Practice Skills Courses.

The components of a skills course may include one or more of the following:

1. Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points upon attaining minimum pass grade of 60% in online MCQ Assessment)
2. Seminars (2 CME points per seminar)
3. Workshops (1 CME point per workshop)
4. Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds (for some courses)
5. Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

A typical FPSC template is a course with six units of distance learning with 30 MCQs test, conducted in two seminars, and also workshops conducted over two afternoon sessions typically, one on Saturday afternoon and one on Sunday afternoon.

E-Learning

The E-Learning programme launched in 2003 has been incorporated into the GDFM training programme. An E-Learning component for each module was introduced, consisting of therapeutic notes, case scenarios, assessment by MCQs and a case review to be put up by a tutorial group.

Accreditation of core CME points

The College is represented by Dr Tan Tze Lee in the Singapore Medical Council (SMC) CME Co-ordinating Committee. The College works closely with the SMC to ensure that the quality of the CME events is acceptable. It continues to advise SMC on the accreditation of core Family Medicine CME events through its panel of Family Medicine (FM) CME advisors appointed by the College.

COMMENCEMENT OF THE ACADEMIC YEAR

The Commencement of the academic year for 2017 will take place at the College of Medicine Building, on 29 July 2017.

GRADUATE DIPLOMA OF FAMILY MEDICINE (GDFM)

The Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) is a vocational training certification for primary care doctors. The aim of this 2-year part-time trainee programme is to train primary care doctors to practise Family Medicine at an enhanced level to meet the needs of the child, the adolescent, the adult and the elderly. The course emphasises on basic clinical, diagnostic and management skills essential to general practice.

The programme is planned to accommodate the busy doctor's schedule as almost all courses that require in-person attendance are conducted outside regular office hours. The course consists of the following:

- 8 modules of Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) with each comprising of 4 workshops, 1 tutorial, online case studies and multiple choice assessments
- 3 Practice Management Courses and 1 elective Family Practice Skills Course

The examination is conducted by Division of Graduate Medical Studies (DGMS), National University of Singapore (NUS). The standard set is a pass in all three segments:

- Written paper I - Applied Knowledge Test: 100 MCQ questions (2 hours)
- Written Paper II - Key Features Problems (KFP): 10 questions (1 hour)
- Skills Assessment in the Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) - 10 stations of 11 minutes each, comprising 3 minutes for reading and 8 minutes for assessment (2 hours)

The GDFM(NUS) is a title or qualification approved by the Singapore Medical Council for display by Registered Medical Practitioners.

The 15th GDFM Examination was held on 24 June 2016 for the written papers and 2 & 3 July 2016 for the OSCE. A total of 66 of the 94 candidates passed, giving a passing rate of 70.21% for the GDFM Examination 2016

MASTER OF MEDICINE (FAMILY MEDICINE) [MMed(FM)]

There are currently two programmes to prepare doctors for the MMed(FM) examinations.

Family Medicine Residency Programme

With effect from 2011, Programme A is organised into a 3-year Residency Program with a greater emphasis on formative assessment and training.

The programme aims to equip the resident with educational and clinical experiences in accordance with ACGME-I standards, which focuses on structured training and close supervision. The resident will undergo clinical rotations in the hospitals and polyclinics, call-back sessions and teaching sessions that combine foundation teaching, continuity clinics, skills workshops/attachments and community medicine.

MMed(FM) College Programme is a structured training programme designed for mature practicing family physicians in Singapore. The programme is jointly organised by the College of Family Physicians Singapore and the DGMS, NUS. This 1-year part-time course provides a comprehensive and structured training programme for doctors working in primary care who have completed the 8 modules of the Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) to prepare them to sit for the MMed(FM) examinations.

The course participants from both the Programmes sit for the same examination – namely, the MMed(FM) examination conducted by the DGMS, NUS.

This examination consists of:

- Written
 - 250 multiple-choice questions
- Clinical
 - Logbook-based viva assessment
 - Slides-based short answer questions
 - Clinical Skills Assessment Stations

The 26th Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) Examination was held on 6 August 2016 (Written), 31 October 2016, 2 November 2016, 3 November 2016 and 5 November 2016 (Clinical). Of the 75 candidates who sat for the examination, 54 were successful.

- Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds (for some courses)
- Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 March 2017

The following notes form an integral part of the financial statements.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

- (a) The College of Family Physicians Singapore is a College registered in Singapore under the Societies Act, Cap. 311. It is also a charity registered under the Charities Act, Cap.37. Its registered office is located at 16 College Road #01-02 College of Medicine Building Singapore 169854.
- (b) The principal activities of the College are to provide education services for undergraduate and postgraduate study courses.

The principal activity of the subsidiary company is set out in note 11 to the financial statements.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are presented in Singapore dollars ("S\$"), which is also the functional currency of the College.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention except as disclosed in the accounting policies below, and comply with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (FRSs), including related Interpretations promulgated by the Accounting Standards Council.

During the financial year, the Group adopted all the applicable new/revised FRSs which are effective on or before 1 April 2016.

The adoption of these new/revised FRSs did not have any material effect on the Group's financial statements and did not result in substantial changes to the Group's accounting policies.

(b) Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgements

Estimates, assumptions concerning the future and judgments are made in the preparation of the financial statements. They affect the application of the Group's accounting policies, reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, and disclosures made. They are assessed on an ongoing basis and are based on experience and relevant factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

(A) Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the balance sheet date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

(b) Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgements (continued)

(A) Key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

(i) Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment and Investment Property

The cost of property, plant and equipment and investment property are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives. Management's estimates of the useful lives of these property, plant and equipment and investment property are disclosed in note 2(h) and 2 (i) respectively. Changes in the expected usage and technological developments could impact the economic useful lives and the residual values of these assets. Therefore, future depreciation charges could be revised. The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and investment property and the depreciation charge for the year are disclosed in note 9 and 10 to the financial statements respectively.

(ii) Income Taxes

Significant judgment is involved in determining the provision for income taxes. There are certain transactions and computations for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. The Group recognises liabilities for expected tax issues based on estimates of whether additional taxes will be due. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recognised, such differences will impact the income tax provision in the period in which such determination is made.

(iii) Impairment of Trade Receivables

The impairment policy for bad and doubtful debts of the Group is based on the evaluation of collectibility and ageing analysis of the accounts receivables and on management's judgment. At the balance sheet date, trade receivables of the Group and the College amounting to \$65,460 (2016: nil) were past due but regarded as not impaired. A considerable amount of judgment is required in assessing the ultimate realization of these receivables, including the current credit worthiness and the past collection history of each customer. If the financial condition of these customers were to deteriorate, resulting in an impairment of their ability to make payment, allowance for impairment will be required.

(B) Critical judgments made in applying accounting policies

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, there are no significant items in the financial statements which require the exercise of critical judgment on the part of the management.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(c) FRS and INT FRS not yet effective

The Group has not applied any new FRS that has been issued but is not yet effective. The management plans to adopt these FRSs in the financial year commencing on or after their respective effective dates.

Except for the FRSs mentioned below which are relevant to the Group's financial statements, the management does not expect the adoption of the other new FRSs that have been issued but are not yet effective to have material impact on the financial statements in the period of initial application.

The management is currently assessing the impact of the following new FRSs that are relevant to the financial statements of the Group in the period of initial application:

FRS 115 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

FRS 115, which replaces *FRS 18 Revenue*, *FRS 11 Construction Contracts* and the related Interpretations when it becomes effective, establishes a five-step model that will apply to revenue arising from contracts. The core principle of FRS 115 is that revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration which an entity expects to be entitled in exchange for goods or services transferred to a customer. Under FRS 115 revenue is recognised when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied i.e. when control of the goods or services underlying the performance obligation is transferred to the customer. FRS 115 also requires more disclosure requirements regarding performance obligations in contracts with customers.

Key issues for the Group include identifying performance obligations, measuring progress toward satisfaction of a performance obligation, and addressing disclosure requirements.

FRS 116 Leases

FRS 116, which replaces *FRS 17 Leases* and the related Interpretations when it becomes effective, introduces a single lessee accounting model and requires a lessee to recognise assets and liabilities for all leases with a term of more than 12 months, unless the underlying asset is of low value. A lessee is required to recognise a right-of-use asset representing its right to use the underlying leased asset and a lease liability representing its obligation to make lease payments.

Lessor accounting requirements under FRS 116 are substantially the same as the current FRS 17. A lessor continues to classify its leases as operating leases or finance leases, and to account for those two types of leases differently.

(d) Revenue Recognition

(i) Course and seminar fees

Income from course and seminar fees (from continuing professional education and training) are recognised when the services are rendered.

(d) Revenue Recognition (continued)

(ii) Sponsorships

Income from sponsorships are accounted for when received or become receivable and related performance obligations are fulfilled.

(iii) Subscriptions and entrance fees

Membership subscriptions are recognised as income over the membership term and entrance fees are recognised as income when they are due.

(iv) Advertising income

Advertising income is recognised when advertisements are placed.

(v) Registration fees

Registration fees are recognised as income when the workshop events are completed.

(vi) Rental income

Rental income from operating lease is recognised on a straight line basis over the lease period.

(vii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss on a time-proportion basis, using the effective interest method.

(e) Government Grants

Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the conditions attached to the grant will be complied with. Where the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised in the profit or loss over the period necessary to match them on a systematic basis to the costs that it is intended to compensate.

(f) Employee Benefits

(i) Defined Contribution Plans

The Group makes contributions to the state provident fund (Central Provident Fund). Such contributions are recognised as compensation expenses in the same period as the employment that gave rise to the contributions.

(ii) Short-term Compensated Absences

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for employee entitlements to annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the balance sheet date.

(g) Income Taxes

Income tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund), in which case, it is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund accordingly.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantially enacted at the balance sheet date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred income tax is provided, using the balance sheet liability method, on all temporary differences at the balance sheet date arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. Currently enacted tax rates are used in the determination of deferred income tax.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred income tax is provided on all taxable temporary differences arising on investment in subsidiary company except where the timing of the reversal of the temporary difference can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax is charged or credited to other comprehensive income or directly in accumulated fund if the tax relates to items that are credited or charged, in the same or a different period, to other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund.

(h) Property, Plant and Equipment

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset if, and only if, it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any.

Any estimated costs of dismantling and removing the property, plant and equipment and reinstating the site to its original condition (reinstatement costs) are capitalised as part of the cost of the property, plant and equipment.

Depreciation is calculated on the straight line basis so as to write off the cost, less the residual value, of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Furniture, fittings and renovation	3 to 5 years
Computers and office equipments	3 to 5 years
Paintings and potteries	10 years

Fully depreciated assets are retained in the financial statements until they are no longer in use.

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods of property, plant and equipment are reviewed and adjusted as appropriate, at each financial year end.

(h) Property, plant and equipment (continued)

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on the derecognition of the asset is recognised in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

(i) Investment Property

Investment property, which is held on a long term basis for investment potential and rental income, is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment loss, recognised in accordance with note 2(o) to the financial statements. Depreciation is calculated on the straight line basis so as to write off the cost, less residual value, of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful live is as follow:

Leasehold property	50 years
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The residual value, useful live and depreciation method of investment property is reviewed and adjusted as appropriate, at each financial year-end.

The cost of major renovations and improvements is capitalised as additions and the carrying amounts of replaced components are written off to profit or loss. The costs of maintenance, repairs and minor improvement are charged to profit or loss when incurred.

Upon the disposal of investment property, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognised in profit or loss.

(j) Investment in Subsidiary Company

(i) Subsidiary and Basis of Consolidation

Investment in subsidiary company is held on a long term basis and stated in the Group's balance sheet at cost less impairment loss, if any.

Subsidiary is the entity over which the Group has control. The Group controls an entity when the Group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. Subsidiary is fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. It is deconsolidated from the date on that control cease.

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the College and its subsidiary company made up to the balance sheet date. The financial statements of the subsidiary company is prepared for the same reporting date as the College. Consistent accounting policies are applied for like transactions and events in similar circumstances.

All intra-group balances, income and expenses and unrealised gains and losses resulting from intra-group transactions are eliminated in full.

(j) Investment in Subsidiary Company (continued)

(ii) Acquisitions

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combinations by the Group. The consideration transferred for the acquisition of a subsidiary or business comprises the fair value of the assets transferred, the liabilities incurred and the equity interests issued by the Group. The consideration transferred also includes the fair value of any contingent consideration arrangement and the fair value of any pre-existing equity interest in the subsidiary.

Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred. Identifiable assets acquired and liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed in a business combination are, with limited exceptions, measured initially at their fair values at the acquisition date. On an acquisition-by-acquisition basis, the Group recognises any non-controlling interest in the acquiree at the date of acquisition either at fair value or at the non-controlling interest's proportionate share of the acquiree's net identifiable assets.

The excess of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interest in the acquiree and the acquisition-date fair value of any previous equity interest in the acquiree over the fair value of the net identifiable assets acquired is recorded as goodwill.

Any excess of the Group's interests in the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities over the cost of business combination is recognised in profit or loss on the date of acquisition.

(iii) Disposals

When a change in the Group ownership interest in a subsidiary results in a loss of control over the subsidiary, the assets and liabilities of the subsidiary including any goodwill are derecognised. Amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in respect of that entity are also reclassified to profit or loss or transferred directly to retained earnings if required by a specific Standard.

Any retained equity interest in the entity is remeasured at fair value. The difference between the carrying amount of the retained interest at the date when control is lost and its fair value is recognised in profit or loss.

(k) Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less allowance for impairment. Receivables with a short duration are not discounted.

When there is objective evidence that the Group will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables, an impairment loss is recognised. The amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the carrying value of the receivable and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the original effective interest rate. The carrying amount of the receivable is reduced directly or through the use of an allowance account. The amount of the loss is recognised in profit or loss.

(k) Trade and other receivables (continued)

If, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss shall be reversed either directly or by adjusting an allowance account. The amount of the reversal shall be recognised in profit or loss.

(l) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, cash at bank and fixed deposits which are subject to insignificant risks of changes in value. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, fixed deposits with maturities more than 3 months are excluded from cash and cash equivalents.

(m) Funds

Accumulated fund is unrestricted fund available for use at the discretion of the Management Committee for the furtherance of the Group's objectives.

Miscellaneous funds are restricted funds which are designated for awards, fellowships and projects of the Group. Currently, the Group has two miscellaneous funds, namely, Victor Louis Fernandez Fellowship Fund and Albert & Mary Lim Award Fund are disclosed in note 16 to the financial statements.

(n) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include trade and other payables. Financial liabilities are recognised on the balance sheet when, and only when, the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial liabilities other than derivatives are recognised initially at fair value of consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial liabilities with short duration are not discounted.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. For financial liabilities other than derivatives, gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortization process. Any gains or losses arising from changes in fair value of derivatives are recognised in profit or loss. Net gains or losses on derivatives include exchange differences.

(o) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

The carrying amounts of the Group's non-financial assets subject to impairment are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's fair value less cost of disposal and its value in use. The value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of the asset and from its disposal at the end of its useful life.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(o) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets (continued)

An impairment loss on a non-revalued asset is recognised in profit or loss. An impairment loss on a revalued asset is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same asset. An impairment loss (except for impairment loss on goodwill) is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount or when there is an indication that the impairment loss recognised for the asset no longer exists or decreases. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined if no impairment loss had been recognised.

(p) Leases

Operating Leases

Leases whereby the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased item are classified as operating leases.

When the Group is the lessor, assets leased out under operating leases are included in investment property. Income arising from such operating lease is recognised on a straight line basis over the lease term.

When the Group is the lessee, operating lease payments are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight line basis over the lease term.

(q) Foreign Currency Transactions and Translation

Foreign currency transactions are recorded, on initial recognition, in the functional currency (Singapore dollars) by applying to the foreign currency amounts the rates of exchange prevailing on the transaction dates. Recorded monetary items that are denominated in foreign currencies as at balance sheet date are translated at the rates ruling on that date. Gain or loss on foreign currency translation are included in profit or loss. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates as at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary assets and liabilities measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined.

(r) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(s) Related Parties

A related party is defined as follows:

- (A) A person or a close member of that person's family is related to the reporting entity if that person:
 - (i) Has control or joint control over the reporting entity;
 - (ii) Has significant influence over the reporting entity; or
 - (iii) Is a member of the key management personnel of the reporting entity or of a parent of the reporting entity.

- (B) An entity is related to the reporting entity if any of the following conditions applies:
 - (i) The entity and the reporting entity are members of the same group (which means that each parent, subsidiary and fellow subsidiary is related to the others).
 - (ii) One entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or an associate or joint venture of a member of a group of which the other entity is a member).
 - (iii) Both entities are joint ventures of the same third party;
 - (iv) One entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity.
 - (v) The entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the College or an entity related to the reporting entity. If the reporting entity is itself such a plan, the sponsoring employers are also related to the reporting entity.
 - (vi) The entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (A).
 - (vii) A person identified in (A)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity).
 - (viii) The entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the reporting entity or to the parent of the reporting entity.

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24. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group and the College are exposed to financial risks arising from its operations and the use of financial instruments. The key financial risks are credit risk, liquidity risk, interest rate risk and foreign currency risk. The management reviews and agrees on policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarised below:

(i) Credit risk

Credit risk is the potential risk of financial loss resulting from the failure of customers or other counterparties to settle their financial and contractual obligations to the Group as and when they fall due.

The Group's exposure to credit risk arises primarily from trade and other receivables. For other financial assets (including cash and cash equivalents), the Group minimises credit risk by dealing with high credit rating counterparties.

Credit evaluations are performed on all tenant. Tenant is required to place security deposits with the Group at the commencement of each tenancy term.

As at the balance sheet date, there was no significant concentration of credit risk. The maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying amount of each financial asset in the balance sheet.

Financial assets that are neither past due nor impaired

Trade and other receivables that are neither past due nor impaired are creditworthy debtors with good payment record. Cash and cash equivalents that neither past due nor impaired are mainly deposits placed with reputable financial institutions with high credit-ratings.

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Group will encounter difficulty in meeting financial obligations due to shortage of funds.

The Group monitors its liquidity risk and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate to finance the Group's operations and to mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows.

All financial liabilities of the Group and the College are repayable on demand or will mature within one year.

(iii) **Interest rate risk**

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of the Group's financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates.

The Group does not have any interest-bearing financial liabilities. Its only exposure to changes in interest rates relates to interest-earning fixed deposits. The Group monitors the movements in interest rates to ensure deposits are placed with financial institutions offering optimal rates of return.

The interest rates and terms of maturity of financial assets of the Group are disclosed in note 15 to the financial statements.

(iv) **Foreign currency risk**

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in foreign exchange rates.

The Group's operational activities are carried out in Singapore dollars, which is the functional currency. The Group's maximum exposure to risk arising from movements in currency exchange rates relating only to cash and bank balances denominated in United States dollars amounting to \$1,556 (2016: \$1,496). No sensitive analysis is prepared as the impact on the surplus of the Group is minimum.

25. **FUND MANAGEMENT**

The primary objective of the Group's fund management policy is to ensure that it maintains strong and healthy capital ratios in order to support its operations and future growth.

The Group targets to maintain an optimum level of accumulated fund. The Group regularly reviews and manages its reserves to ensure optimal capital structure, taking into consideration the future capital requirements of the Group and capital efficiency, prevailing and projected income, projected operating cash flows and projected capital expenditures.

The Group is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements.

There were no changes to the Group's approach to fund management since the previous financial year.

26. **FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL ASSETS AND LIABILITIES**
