HERALDRY OF THE COLLEGE

The upper portion of the badge of the College consists of a golden lion in a passant stance superimposed on the chief which is red in colour.

The lower portion of the badge consists of a green cross superimposed on a white shield. The green cross symbolizes the humanitarian mission of our College. White is the colour of purity which is our aim.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE 2018



The past year has been a busy one for the College, where we have seen many good developments for family medicine! As we continue to work to advance the cause of family medicine in our fair isle, the future for our specialty looks especially bright. I am pleased to report that the 26th Council has done very well and its work is well reported in the pages below.

Membership

The membership of the College as of 31 March 2018 increased from 1998 to 2202. This represents an over 10% increase in membership numbers and bodes well for our fraternity. This rate of increase makes us very hopeful that our numbers will continue to grow well with each year. A larger membership would reflect improved representation of our family medicine and primary care fraternity, giving us a stronger mandate to be the voice of family medicine in Singapore. Our Council continues to engage medical students to increase the visibility of family medicine. Together with the Joint Committee on Family Medicine Singapore (JCFMS), our co-organised career seminars have attracted many, much to the tremendous effort by the medical student Special Interest Group in Family Medicine. Many of our young colleagues have shown interest in family medicine as a career option, as evidenced by the large numbers applying for the Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) course, as well as many applicants for the Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) [MMed(FM)], in both the residency and College courses.

Assets

The College's financial situation continues on a strong footing, all thanks to the prudent fiscal stewardship of our Council. College's financial reserves remain healthy, providing stability and security for the operations of our College. Although we continue to generate a healthy surplus, we need to be constantly mindful of the need for fiscal prudence, so as to ensure our College continues to be financially secure, and able to be a viable champion of family medicine into the future.

Courses conducted

The GDFM, the MMed(FM) (College Programme) and the Fellowship of the College of Family Physicians Singapore (By Assessment) (FCFPS) are the signature programmes run by our College and they continue to do well. The curriculum and delivery of these programmes are constantly reviewed and improved over the years. We have just launched our enhanced curriculum for the GDFM, to cater the needs of our ageing population. We have 247 applicants for the GDFM this year and we expect these numbers to increase over the years.

Partnerships

Our College continues to have excellent relationships with the Singapore Medical Association and the Academy of Medicine Singapore. The three professional bodies meet regularly, and keep each other abreast of our activities. On a number of occasions that warranted a profession-wide approach, we had taken joint action, issuing joint statements on a number of issues. The College continues to have a good working relationship with the Ministry of Health and the Singapore Medical Council. We are consulted regularly on policy matters, with many of our suggestions being well-received, resulting in improvements to proposed regulations.

The 6th Asia Pacific Primary Care Research Conference, in conjunction with the Family Medicine Symposium, was held at the Academia from 21-23 Sept 2017. This was co-organized by the College, SingHealth Polyclinics and Singhealth Duke-NUS Family Medicine Academic Clinical Programme. The conference was a resounding success, with over 380 registrants from 9 countries, including Malaysia, Australia, India, Sri Lanka, the United Kingdom, Fiji, China and Hong Kong. The FM symposium also attracted many participants, with much interest in the Geriatrics and Acupuncture breakout sessions.

Major Developments

The 26th Council continued well the work of the College in various initiatives. In particular, we have worked closely with the Ministry of Health to further enhance the Graduate Diploma of Family Medicine (GDFM).

The enhancement of the GDFM is an on-going development between College and the Primary and Community Care (PCC) Division of the Ministry of Health. The revamp incorporates enhancements in areas of need such as chronic disease management, geriatrics and mental health. An additional Certificate of Competency for competency in community hospital practice is available to those with a special interest in community hospital work. This certificate is recognised by the community hospitals, and will be issued by the College.

We are now midway through the term of the 26th Council. It is through Unity that we have been able to achieve so much in such a short time. A huge word of thanks to our dedicated and self-sacrificing Council Members, who have worked tirelessly for the profession and fraternity! We are also very grateful to our academic faculty who serve in our College training programmes. It is because of their commitment and dedication that we are able to pass on the skills and knowledge to the next generation of family physicians. Thank you very much!

We have also to thank our excellent Secretariat, who work long and hard to make the operations of College run smoothly. Thank you, Jennifer, Anica, Patricia, Guorong, Chester, Joel, Qiyin and Peggy!

It has been a privilege to serve the College and the fraternity, and we seek your continued support and mandate to continue the good work of the College.

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT/ MEDICAL EDUCATION PROGRAMMES AND COURSES

The College promotes Continuing Professional Development (CPD) and Continuing Medical Education (CME) through the Family Medicine Modular Course, Family Practice Skills Course, MMed (Family Medicine) Programme B, Family Medicine Membership and Fellowship Programme.

The Institute of Family Medicine (IFM), an organ within the College, plays a significant role in developing the contents and syllabi of these programmes and courses.

During the year the IFM reviewed, updated and edited the notes as well as their e-learning components for Modules 4, 5, 6 and 7 of the Family Medicine Modular Course to make them more relevant and user-friendly to the course participants.

The Family Medicine Modular Course consists of 8 modules of knowledge acquisition and is a requirement for doctors who are preparing for the Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) Programme and the Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) College Programme. Each year, four modules are covered.

For the year April 2017 - March 2018, there were 236 trainees registered in the GDFM course, 20 trainees in the MMed(FM) College Route and 23 trainees in the Fellowship [FCFP(S)] programme.

Family Practice Skills Course (FPSC)

During this financial year, the College conducted four Family Practice Skills Courses.

The components of a skills course may include one or more of the following:

1. Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points upon attaining minimum pass grade of 60% in online MCQ Assessment)
2. Seminars (2 CME points per seminar)
3. Workshops (1 CME point per workshop)
4. Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds (for some courses)
5. Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

A typical FPSC template is a course with six units of distance learning with 30 MCQs test, conducted in two seminars, and also workshops conducted over two afternoon sessions typically, one on Saturday afternoon and one on Sunday afternoon.

E-Learning

The E-Learning programme launched in 2003 has been incorporated into the GDFM training programme. An E-Learning component for each module was introduced, consisting of therapeutic notes, case scenarios, assessment by MCQs and a case review to be put up by a tutorial group.

Accreditation of core CME points

The College is represented by Adj Asst Prof Tan Tze Lee in the Singapore Medical Council (SMC) CME Co-ordinating Committee. The College works closely with the SMC to ensure that the quality of the CME events is acceptable. It continues to advise SMC on the accreditation of core Family Medicine CME events through its panel of Family Medicine (FM) CME advisors appointed by the College.

COMMENCEMENT OF THE ACADEMIC YEAR

The Commencement of the academic year for 2018 will take place at the College of Medicine Building, on 28 July 2018.

GRADUATE DIPLOMA OF FAMILY MEDICINE (GDFM)

The Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) is a vocational training certification for primary care doctors. The aim of this 2-year part-time trainee programme is to train primary care doctors to practise Family Medicine at an enhanced level to meet the needs of the child, the adolescent, the adult and the elderly. The course emphasises on basic clinical, diagnostic and management skills essential to general practice.

The programme is planned to accommodate the busy doctor's schedule as almost all courses that require in-person attendance are conducted outside regular office hours. The course consists of the following:

- 8 modules of Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) with each comprising of 4 workshops, 1 tutorial, online case studies and multiple choice assessments
- 3 Practice Management Courses and 1 elective Family Practice Skills Course

The examination is conducted by Division of Graduate Medical Studies (DGMS), National University of Singapore (NUS). The standard set is a pass in all three segments:

- Written paper I - Applied Knowledge Test: 100 MCQ questions (2 hours)
- Written Paper II - Key Features Problems (KFP): 10 questions (1 hour)
- Skills Assessment in the Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) - 10 stations of 11 minutes each, comprising 3 minutes for reading and 8 minutes for assessment (2 hours)

The GDFM(NUS) is a title or qualification approved by the Singapore Medical Council for display by Registered Medical Practitioners.

The 16th GDFM Examination was held on 23 June 2017 for the written papers and 1 & 8 July 2017 for the OSCE. A total of 78 of the 130 candidates passed, giving a passing rate of 60% for the GDFM Examination 2017.

MASTER OF MEDICINE (FAMILY MEDICINE) [MMed(FM)]

There are currently two programmes to prepare doctors for the MMed(FM) examinations.

Family Medicine Residency Programme

The Family Medicine Residency Programme aims to equip the resident with educational and clinical experiences in accordance with ACGME-I standards, which focuses on structured training and close supervision. The resident will undergo clinical rotations in the hospitals and polyclinics, call-back sessions and teaching sessions that combine foundation teaching, continuity clinics, skills workshops/ attachments and community medicine.

MMed(FM) College Programme

The programme is a structured training programme designed for mature practising family physicians in Singapore. The programme is jointly organised by the College of Family Physicians Singapore and the DGMS, NUS. This 1-year part-time course provides a comprehensive and structured training programme for doctors working in primary care who have completed the 8 modules of the Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) to prepare them to sit for the MMed(FM) examinations.

The course participants from both the Programmes sit for the same examination – namely, the MMed(FM) examination conducted by the DGMS, NUS

This examination consists of:

- Written
 - 250 multiple-choice questions
- Clinical
 - Logbook-based viva assessment
 - Slides-based short answer questions
 - Clinical Skills Assessment Stations

The 27th Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) Examination was held on 5 August 2017 (Written), 4, 6, 7, 8 and 11 November 2017 (Clinical). Of the 86 candidates who sat for the examination, 45 were successful.

Family Practice Skills Course (FPSC)

The Family Practice Skills Courses (FPSC) continue to serve the continuing professional development needs of the General Practitioner/ Family Physician. Each skills course includes one or more of the following components in which the family physician can choose to participate in:

- Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points upon attaining minimum pass grade of 60% in online MCQ Assessment)
- Seminars (2 CME points per seminar)
- Workshops (1 CME point per workshop)
- Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds (for some courses)
- Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

Table 6 shows the number of doctors who participated in the Family Practice Skills Course for the year under review.

The IFM is encouraged by the big increase in the number of doctors enrolled in the GDFM modular courses year on year. The Family Practice Skills Courses also saw an increase in some of the courses.

The enrolment numbers in the 2017 intake was 236 compared to 169 in the 2016 intake. The 4 Family Practice Skills Courses had attendances ranging from 122 to 225 in the seminars and 110 to 220 in the workshop; the number of doctors who did the CME reading and passed the MCQs ranged from 186 to 516. Newer topics attracted bigger attendances e.g., the extended consultation, and updates in rheumatology.

We look forward to another year of serving our members.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 March 2018

The following notes form an integral part of the financial statements.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

- (a) The College of Family Physicians Singapore is a College registered in Singapore under the Societies Act, Cap. 311. It is also a charity registered under the Charities Act, Cap.37. Its registered office is located at 16 College Road #01-02 College of Medicine Building Singapore 169854.
- (b) The principal activities of the College are to provide education services for undergraduate and postgraduate study courses.

The principal activity of the subsidiary company is set out in note 11 to the financial statements.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are presented in Singapore dollars ("S\$"), which is also the functional currency of the College.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention except as disclosed in the accounting policies below, and comply with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (FRSs), including related Interpretations promulgated by the Accounting Standards Council.

During the financial year, the Group adopted all the applicable new/revised FRSs which are effective on or before 1 April 2017.

The adoption of these new/revised FRSs did not have any material effect on the Group's financial statements and did not result in substantial changes to the Group's accounting policies.

(b) Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgements

Estimates, assumptions concerning the future and judgments are made in the preparation of the financial statements. They affect the application of the Group's accounting policies, reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, and disclosures made. They are assessed on an ongoing basis and are based on experience and relevant factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

(A) Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the balance sheet date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

(A) Key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

(i) Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment and Investment Property

The cost of property, plant and equipment and investment property are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives. Management's estimates of the useful lives of these property, plant and equipment and investment property are disclosed in note 2(h) and 2 (i) respectively. Changes in the expected usage and technological developments could impact the economic useful lives and the residual values of these assets. Therefore, future depreciation charges could be revised. The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and investment property and the depreciation charge for the year are disclosed in note 9 and 10 to the financial statements respectively.

(ii) Income Taxes

Significant judgment is involved in determining the provision for income taxes. There are certain transactions and computations for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. The Group recognises liabilities for expected tax issues based on estimates of whether additional taxes will be due. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recognised, such differences will impact the income tax provision in the period in which such determination is made.

(iii) Impairment of Trade Receivables

The impairment policy for bad and doubtful debts of the Group is based on the evaluation of collectibility and ageing analysis of the accounts receivables and on management's judgment. At the balance sheet date, trade receivables of the Group and the College amounting to \$79,875 (2017: \$65,460) were past due but regarded as not impaired. A considerable amount of judgment is required in assessing the ultimate realization of these receivables, including the current credit worthiness and the past collection history of each customer. If the financial condition of these customers were to deteriorate, resulting in an impairment of their ability to make payment, allowance for impairment will be required.

(B) Critical judgments made in applying accounting policies

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, there are no significant items in the financial statements which require the exercise of critical judgment on the part of the management.

(c) FRSs issued but not yet effective

The Group has not applied any new FRS that has been issued but is not yet effective. The management plan to adopt these FRSs in the first financial year commencing on or after their respective effective dates.

The nature of the impending changes in accounting policy on adoption of the above new FRSs are described below.

FRS 109 Financial Instruments

FRS 109, which replaces *FRS 39 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement* when it becomes effective, introduces new requirements for classification and measurement of financial assets, impairment of financial assets and hedge accounting.

FRS 109 establishes three primary measurement categories for financial assets: amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI) and fair value through profit or loss (FVPL). The basis of classification depends on the entity's business model and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset. Investments in equity instruments are required to be measured at fair value through profit or loss, with the irrevocable option at inception to present changes in fair value in other comprehensive income. Gains and losses realised on the sale of financial assets at FVOCI are not transferred to profit or loss on sale but reclassified from the FVOCI reserve to accumulated fund within total funds.

Under FRS 109, there are no changes to the classification and measurement requirements for financial liabilities except for the recognition of fair value changes arising from changes in own credit risk. For liabilities designated at fair value through profit or loss, such changes are recognised in other comprehensive income.

FRS 109 relaxes the rules-based hedge effectiveness testing by removing the 80% to 125% bright line threshold for hedge effectiveness testing. It requires an economic relationship between the hedged item and hedging instrument and for the 'hedged ratio' to be the same as the one management uses for risk management purposes.

The impairment requirements in FRS 109 are based on an expected credit loss model, which replaces the FRS 39 incurred loss model. It applies to financial assets classified at amortised cost, debt instruments measured at FVOCI, lease receivables, contract assets, loan commitments and certain financial guarantee contracts.

Potential impact on the financial statements

The Group will apply FRS 109 retrospectively on its effective date on 1 January 2018.

The Group has assessed the business models that are applicable on 1 January 2018 to financial assets so as to classify them into appropriate categories under FRS 109.

The Group does not expect a significant change to the measurement basis arising from the new classification and measurement model under FRS 109.

Cash and cash equivalents and receivables, currently classified as “loans and receivables” measured on amortised cost basis, will continue to be accounted for using the amortised cost model under FRS 109.

The Group does not have significant financial assets that are subject to impairment assessment under the expected credit loss impairment model under FRS 109.

FRS 115 Revenue from Contracts with Customers

FRS 115, which replaces FRS 11 Construction Contracts, FRS 18 Revenue and the related Interpretations when it becomes effective, establishes a five-step model that will apply to revenue arising from contracts.

The core principle of FRS 115 is that an entity recognises revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised in accordance with that core principle by applying the following steps:

- Step 1: Identify the contract(s) with a customer
- Step 2: Identify the performance obligations in the contract
- Step 3: Determine the transaction price
- Step 4: Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations in the contract
- Step 5: Recognise revenue when (or as) the entity satisfies a performance obligation

Revenue is recognised when (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied by the transfer of control of the promised good or service to the customer. Control refers to the ability to direct the use of, and obtain substantially all the remaining benefits from, the good or service.

FRS 115 also includes a cohesive set of disclosure requirements that will provide sufficient information in the financial statements to enable users to understand the nature, amount, timing and uncertainty of revenue and cash flows arising from the entity's contracts with customers.

Potential impact on financial statements

The Group will adopt FRS 115 retrospectively in accordance with the requirements of the Standard on its effective date on 1 January 2018.

Based on the management's assessment, the Group does not expect significant changes to the recognition criteria for most of its existing revenue arrangements.

FRS 116 Leases

FRS 116, which replaces FRS 17 Leases and the related Interpretations when it becomes effective, requires lessees to recognise most leases on the balance sheet to reflect the rights to use the leased assets and the associated obligations for lease payments as well as the corresponding interest expense and depreciation charges. The standard includes two recognition exemptions for lessees - short-term leases and leases of 'low value' assets.

FRS 116 Leases (continued)

Lessor accounting requirements under FRS 116 are substantially the same as the current FRS 17. A lessor continues to classify its leases as either operating leases or finance leases, and to account for those two types of leases differently.

Potential impact on financial statements

FRS 116 requires a lessee to apply this Standard retrospectively in accordance with the requirements of the Standard on its effective date on 1 January 2019.

Based on preliminary assessment of the Group's existing operating lease arrangements as a lessee, the management expects most of the leases to be recognised as right-of-use (ROU) assets with corresponding lease liabilities under the new standard.

(d) Revenue Recognition

(i) Course and seminar fees

Income from course and seminar fees (from continuing professional education and training) are recognised when the services are rendered.

(ii) Sponsorships

Income from sponsorships are accounted for when received or become receivable and related performance obligations are fulfilled.

(iii) Subscriptions and entrance fees

Membership subscriptions are recognised as income over the membership term and entrance fees are recognised as income when they are due.

(iv) Advertising income

Advertising income is recognised when advertisements are placed.

(v) Registration fees

Registration fees are recognised as income when the workshop events are completed.

(vi) Rental income

Rental income from operating lease is recognised on a straight line basis over the lease period.

(vii) Interest income

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss on a time-proportion basis, using the effective interest method.

(e) Government Grants

Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the conditions attached to the grant will be complied with. Grants related to income are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Group recognises as expenses the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate.

(f) Employee Benefits

(i) Defined Contribution Plans

The Group makes contributions to the state provident fund (Central Provident Fund). Such contributions are recognised as compensation expenses in the same period as the employment that gave rise to the contributions.

(ii) Short-term Compensated Absences

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for employee entitlements to annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the balance sheet date.

(g) Income Taxes

Income tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund), in which case, it is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund accordingly.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantially enacted at the balance sheet date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred income tax is provided, using the balance sheet liability method, on all temporary differences at the balance sheet date arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. Currently enacted tax rates are used in the determination of deferred income tax.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred income tax is provided on all taxable temporary differences arising on investment in subsidiary company except where the timing of the reversal of the temporary difference can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax is charged or credited to other comprehensive income or directly in accumulated fund if the tax relates to items that are credited or charged, in the same or a different period, to other comprehensive income or directly to accumulated fund.

(h) Property, Plant and Equipment

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset if, and only if, it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any.

Any estimated costs of dismantling and removing the property, plant and equipment and reinstating the site to its original condition (reinstatement costs) are capitalised as part of the cost of the property, plant and equipment.

(h) Property, Plant and Equipment (continued)

Depreciation is calculated on the straight line basis so as to write off the cost, less the residual value, of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Furniture, fittings and renovation	3 to 5 years
Computers and office equipments	3 to 5 years
Paintings and potteries	10 years

Fully depreciated assets are retained in the financial statements until they are no longer in use.

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods of property, plant and equipment are reviewed and adjusted as appropriate, at each financial year end.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the item, and shall be included in profit or loss when the item is derecognised.

(i) Investment Property

Investment property, which is held on a long term basis for investment potential and rental income, is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment loss, recognised in accordance with note 2(o) to the financial statements. Depreciation is calculated on the straight line basis so as to write off the cost, less residual value, of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful life is as follow:

Leasehold property	50 years
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The residual value, useful live and depreciation method of investment property is reviewed and adjusted as appropriate, at each financial year-end.

The cost of major renovations and improvements is capitalised as additions and the carrying amounts of replaced components are written off to profit or loss. The costs of maintenance, repairs and minor improvement are charged to profit or loss when incurred.

Upon the disposal of investment property, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognised in profit or loss.

(j) Investment in Subsidiary Company

(i) Subsidiary and Basis of Consolidation

Investment in subsidiary company is held on a long term basis and stated in the Group's balance sheet at cost less impairment loss, if any.

Subsidiary is the entity over which the Group has control. The Group controls an entity when the Group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. Subsidiary is fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. It is deconsolidated from the date on that control cease.

(i) Subsidiary and Basis of Consolidation (continued)

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the College and its subsidiary company made up to the balance sheet date. The financial statements of the subsidiary company is prepared for the same reporting date as the College. Consistent accounting policies are applied for like transactions and events in similar circumstances.

All intra-group balances, income and expenses and unrealised gains and losses resulting from intra-group transactions are eliminated in full.

(ii) Acquisitions

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combinations by the Group. The consideration transferred for the acquisition of a subsidiary or business comprises the fair value of the assets transferred, the liabilities incurred and the equity interests issued by the Group. The consideration transferred also includes the fair value of any contingent consideration arrangement and the fair value of any pre-existing equity interest in the subsidiary.

Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred. Identifiable assets acquired and liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed in a business combination are, with limited exceptions, measured initially at their fair values at the acquisition date. On an acquisition-by-acquisition basis, the Group recognises any non-controlling interest in the acquiree at the date of acquisition either at fair value or at the non-controlling interest's proportionate share of the acquiree's net identifiable assets.

The excess of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interest in the acquiree and the acquisition-date fair value of any previous equity interest in the acquiree over the fair value of the net identifiable assets acquired is recorded as goodwill.

Any excess of the Group's interests in the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities over the cost of business combination is recognised in profit or loss on the date of acquisition.

(iii) Disposals

When a change in the Group ownership interest in a subsidiary results in a loss of control over the subsidiary, the assets and liabilities of the subsidiary including any goodwill are derecognised. Amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in respect of that entity are also reclassified to profit or loss or transferred directly to retained earnings if required by a specific Standard.

Any retained equity interest in the entity is remeasured at fair value. The difference between the carrying amount of the retained interest at the date when control is lost and its fair value is recognised in profit or loss.

(k) Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less allowance for impairment. Receivables with a short duration are not discounted.

When there is objective evidence that the Group will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables, an impairment loss is recognised. The amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the carrying value of the receivable and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the original effective interest rate. The carrying amount of the receivable is reduced directly or through the use of an allowance account. The amount of the loss is recognised in profit or loss.

If, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss shall be reversed either directly or by adjusting an allowance account. The amount of the reversal shall be recognised in profit or loss.

(l) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, cash at bank and fixed deposits which are subject to insignificant risks of changes in value. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, fixed deposits with original maturities more than 3 months are excluded from cash and cash equivalents.

(m) Funds

Accumulated fund is unrestricted fund available for use at the discretion of the Management Committee for the furtherance of the Group's objectives.

Miscellaneous funds are restricted funds which are designated for awards, fellowships, research support and projects of the Group. Currently, the Group has 4 miscellaneous funds, namely, Dr Koh Eng Kheng Award Fund, Primary Care Research Fund, Victor Louis Fernandez Fellowship Fund and Albert & Mary Lim Award Fund are disclosed in note 16 to the financial statements.

(n) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include other payables. Financial liabilities are recognised on the balance sheet when, and only when, the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial liabilities other than derivatives are recognised initially at fair value of consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial liabilities with short duration are not discounted.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. For financial liabilities other than derivatives, gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortization process. Any gains or losses arising from changes in fair value of derivatives are recognised in profit or loss. Net gains or losses on derivatives include exchange differences.

(o) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

The carrying amounts of the Group's non-financial assets subject to impairment are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the greater of the asset's fair value less cost of disposal and its value in use. The value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of the asset and from its disposal at the end of its useful life.

An impairment loss on a non-revalued asset is recognised in profit or loss. An impairment loss on a revalued asset is recognised in other comprehensive income to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same asset. An impairment loss (except for impairment loss on goodwill) is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount or when there is an indication that the impairment loss recognised for the asset no longer exists or decreases. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined if no impairment loss had been recognised.

(p) Leases

Operating Leases

Leases whereby the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased item are classified as operating leases.

When the Group is the lessor, assets leased out under operating leases are included in investment property. Income arising from such operating lease is recognised on a straight line basis over the lease term.

When the Group is the lessee, operating lease payments are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight line basis over the lease term.

(q) Foreign Currency Transactions and Translation

Foreign currency transactions are recorded, on initial recognition, in the functional currency (Singapore dollars) by applying to the foreign currency amounts the rates of exchange prevailing on the transaction dates. Recorded monetary items that are denominated in foreign currencies as at balance sheet date are translated at the rates ruling on that date. Gain or loss on foreign currency translation are included in profit or loss. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates as at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary assets and liabilities measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined.

(r) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made.

- (B) An entity is related to the reporting entity if any of the following conditions applies:
- (i) The entity and the reporting entity are members of the same group (which means that each parent, subsidiary and fellow subsidiary is related to the others).
 - (ii) One entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or an associate or joint venture of a member of a group of which the other entity is a member).
 - (iii) Both entities are joint ventures of the same third party;
 - (iv) One entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity.
 - (v) The entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the College or an entity related to the reporting entity. If the reporting entity is itself such a plan, the sponsoring employers are also related to the reporting entity.
 - (vi) The entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (A).
 - (vii) A person identified in (A)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity).
 - (viii) The entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the reporting entity or to the parent of the reporting entity.

23. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group and the College are exposed to financial risks arising from its operations and the use of financial instruments. The key financial risks are credit risk, liquidity risk, interest rate risk and foreign currency risk. The management reviews and agrees on policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarised below:

(i) Credit risk

Credit risk is the potential risk of financial loss resulting from the failure of customers or other counterparties to settle their financial and contractual obligations to the Group as and when they fall due.

The Group's exposure to credit risk arises primarily from trade and other receivables. For other financial assets (including cash and cash equivalents), the Group minimises credit risk by dealing with high credit rating counterparties.

Credit evaluations are performed on all tenant. Tenant is required to place security deposits with the Group at the commencement of each tenancy term.

As at the balance sheet date, there was no significant concentration of credit risk. The maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying amount of each financial asset in the balance sheet.

Financial assets that are neither past due nor impaired

Trade and other receivables that are neither past due nor impaired are creditworthy debtors with good payment record. Cash and cash equivalents that neither past due nor impaired are mainly deposits placed with reputable financial institutions with high credit-ratings.

The Group monitors its liquidity risk and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate to finance the Group's operations and to mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows.

All financial liabilities of the Group and the College are repayable on demand or will mature within one year.

(iii) Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of the Group's financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates.

The Group does not have any interest-bearing financial liabilities. Its only exposure to changes in interest rates relates to interest-earning fixed deposits. The Group monitors the movements in interest rates to ensure deposits are placed with financial institutions offering optimal rates of return.

The interest rates and terms of maturity of financial assets of the Group are disclosed in note 15 to the financial statements.

(iv) Foreign currency risk

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in foreign exchange rates.

The Group's operational activities are carried out in Singapore dollars, which is the functional currency. The Group's maximum exposure to risk arising from movements in currency exchange rates relating only to cash and bank balances denominated in United States dollars amounting to nil (2017: \$1,556). No sensitive analysis is prepared as the impact on the surplus of the Group is minimum.

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24. FUND MANAGEMENT

The primary objective of the Group's fund management policy is to ensure that it maintains strong and healthy capital ratios in order to support its operations and future growth.

The Group targets to maintain an optimum level of accumulated fund. The Group regularly reviews and manages its reserves to ensure optimal capital structure, taking into consideration the future capital requirements of the Group and capital efficiency, prevailing and projected income, projected operating cash flows and projected capital expenditures.

The Group is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements.

There were no changes to the Group's approach to fund management since the previous financial year.

25. FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

The fair values of financial instruments which are carried at fair value are classified based on a three-level fair value measurement hierarchy defined as follows:-

- Level 1 - quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 - valuation techniques using inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices)
- Level 3 - valuation techniques using inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs)

The Group does not apply fair value accounting in the measurement of its non-financial assets. The fair value of investment property is disclosed in note 10, represents recurring fair value measurements under Level 3 of the fair value hierarchy.

The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents, current receivables and payables approximate their fair values due to short term nature.

It is not practicable to determine with sufficient reliability the fair value of non-interest bearing amount due from subsidiary company which is classified as non-current asset since the amount has no fixed terms of repayment.
